

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Department Store **Broyhill Seeks More Natural Gas For State** Congress has done nothing time some areas of the to coordinate its efforts to

Tenth District Congress man James T. Broyhill, of Lenoir, was sworn in to office Tuesday at 2 p. m. to begin his eighth term of ervice in the U.S. House of Representatives. Shortly after the

swearing in ceremony the veteran lawmaker introduced several bills to be considered by the 95th Congress. One of the most important is an "emergency bill" to alleviate natural gas shortages such as North Carolina and South Carolina are now ex-

Broyhill's bill called the "Natural Gas Temporary Purchase Act" would allow interstate pipelines such as Transcontinential Pipeline Co. to purchase "emergency" natural gas from intrastate pipeline companies. Transcontinential, the only pipeline service North Carolina is currently experiencing severe shortages of natural gas.

The nation's natural gas shortage continues to be one of the largest problems facing the Congress.

"I believe the public is beginning to pay the price of over regulation and Congressional inaction. I am introducing this bill because it is obvious that Congress needs to take immediate steps to protect homeowners, small businesses, and industrial users who have no ready substitute for natural gas," Broyhill said.

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"There are roughly 170 small commercial, industrial and high priority natural gas users in the two Carolinas which are threatened with a potential cutoff of their natural gas supplies this month," Broyhill went on to say. These companies represent 50,000 jobs in our State alone. I believe my bill is crucial not only to the wellbeing of the citizens of our region but also to the wellbeing of our Nation's eco-nomy," Broyhill stated. Broyhill said there is

little doubt that the 95th Congress will be considering legislative proposals to increase natural gas supplies for the long term. "In the mean-

nation are facing a present crisis, I am urging Congress to act promptly on an emergency bill to prevent an immediate economic crisis in states like North Carolina and South Caro-

Broyhill also introduced legislation creating a select House Committee on energy. Broyhill said that in the last two Congresses there have been approximately 35,000 energy re-lated bills introduced.
