other person. In 1949, the Supreme Court recognized the relationship between a general contractor and a subcontractor at a construction site and said the Taft-Hartley law prohibiting secondary boycotts was directly applicable to each situations. Ever since then, legislation has been offered in each Congress to exempt construction trades from the requirements of this

This legislation would have also allowed unionized workers to picket an entire construction site simply because one of the subcontractors was using non-union labor. The result would have been that few contractors would run the risk of hiring a subcontractor who used non-union labor. The contractor would justiflably be afraid that if he did so, the total construction site could be closed down. The effect would therefore be that non-union construction workers would be unable to find work simply because they chose not to join a union.

I believe every worker has the right to join a union and be represented contract negotiations by the union if he or she chooses to. I also believe that every worker has the right not to join a union. No American worker should have to fear being unable to find a job, just because he or she chooses not to become a member of a union.

Broad public support for common site picketing legislation has been noticeable absent this year. Even rank and file construction union members showed little enthusiasm for this bill. The support for this legislation came almost solely from certain national union leaders whose obvious goal was to compel workers to join unions against their wills. This bill would have provided no wage in-creases or fringe benefits for rank and file union members, just more power

In March of this year, the influential and nationally-known Roper polling organization conducted a nationwide poll asking a random sampling of the American public whether or not a single union should be able to close down a construction site. The poll results showed that 77 percent of against the concept of this bill. Despite this strong sentiment, liberal majority leadership worked tirelessly to pass the bill, over the objections of those of us in the minority and those more conservative members of the majority party.

President Carter had made it clear to labor leaders during his campaign that he would sign this bill if Congress passed it. Last year, similar legislation narrowly passed the Congress, but President Ford vetoed it. President Carter's Secretary of Labor, Ray Marshall, had testified in favor of the bill. However, despite mild ministration support and heavy union lobbying a majority in Congress responded to the public will and rejected this

unwise legislation. I believe the defeat of this bill is a clear victory for the American worker and consumer. It was a victory against compulsory unionism runaway inflation in the construction industry. But most of all, it was a ringing defeat for the majority leadership in Congress, which had tried once again, as in the case of the Congressional pay increase, to ignore the will of the American people.

Last Wednesday night, the House of Representatives restored a lot of peoples' confidence in representative govern-
