That selection will be narrowed, they said, if the soil is harboring the

Granville wilt organism. This bacterial disease is fairly widespread in North Carolina and might be suspected if tomatoes in

past years have wilted and died.

If you suspect Granville wilt is a problem in your garden, North Carolina State University extension speciaelists suggest planting either Venus er Saturn varieties. These were developed at NCSU and are resistant to Granville wilt.

These may not produce tomato that is quite as large as those of favorites such as Better Boy Hybrid, Manapal or Marion, but they should allow you to produce tomatoes in wiltprone gardens.
