Rash Of Break-Ins Reported

Kings Mountain Police are investigating a rash of break-ins over the weekend.

Three television sets, a stereo-radio set, two cameras, a movie projector, a ski set, slide viewer and Mitchell 300 reel valued at \$1516.00 were stolen from the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Otis Smith Monday night, according to painters on the scene early Tuesday who reported the house was open

when they arrived for work. Ptl. R. E. Grindstaff said the Smiths had moved to Kings Mountain Inn while their home at 312 Maner Rd. was being remodeled after a fire which badly damaged the residence five weeks ago. Mr. Smith told KMPD he locked the house at 8:30 p. m. Monday night.

night, prying open the front of a pinball machine and removing \$60 in quarters and taking four lighters and 15 cartons of cigarettes valued at \$65.50.
