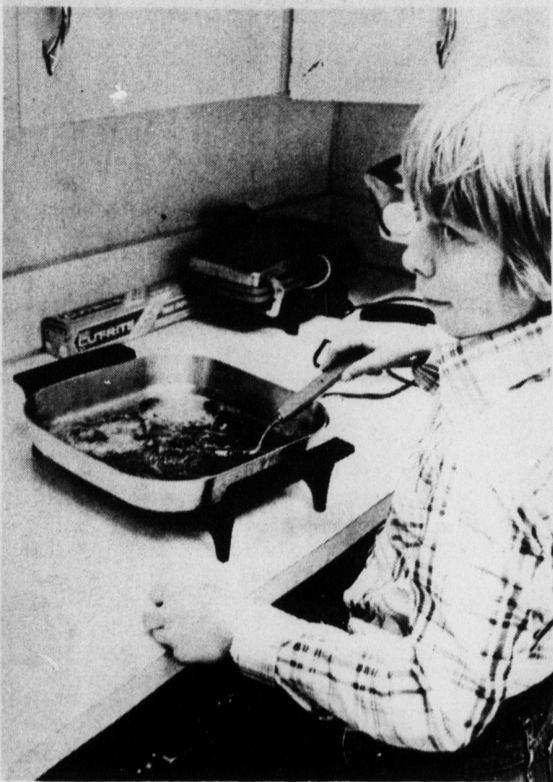


Central Students Prepare For Life

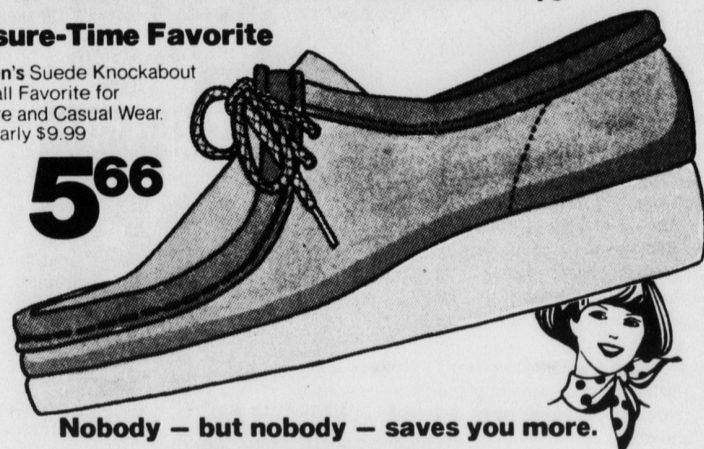

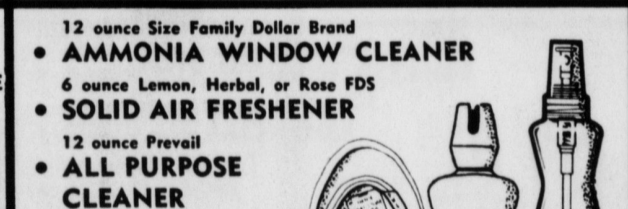

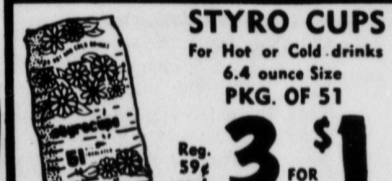
