Tractor Buy Decisions Shifting Toward Diesel

Fuel consumption is just as important in selecting a farm tractor as it is in buying a family car. Farmers will be paying more attention to this as the post-harvest tractor trading season arrives.

An important factor related to tractor fuel costs has been the change in the price of gasoline and diesel-fueled tractors, according to North Carolina State University extension engineers.

The price difference between diesel and gas-powered has been decreasing. Diesel engine small tractors and tractors used on a limited basis are more practical, compared to gasoline tractors, than they were in the past.

Generally, a diesel tractor will save both fuel and money. In most farming situations, the potential for recapturing the additional investment is excellent.

Diesels are more efficient users of fuel than gasoline

engines. A diesel engine consumes about 70 per cent as much fuel per unit of work as a gasoline engine. This is due to the diesel's higher air compression ratio in the cylinder.

The diesel's higher compression ratio results in a more powerful piston stroke, but it also requires the diesel to be made stronger than gasoline engines.

Because the diesel must be stronger, it has traditionally been more expensive. The decision to buy a diesel was often based on whether the additional expense would be recaptured through fuel savings. Now the difference between the initial cost of gasoline and diesel tractor is decreasing, which means that the hours of use required to make a diesel as economical as a gasoline tractor are decreasing.

The decision to buy diesel or gasoline tractors appears to be shifting more in favor of the diesel.

Christmas Parade Set For Tuesday, November 29

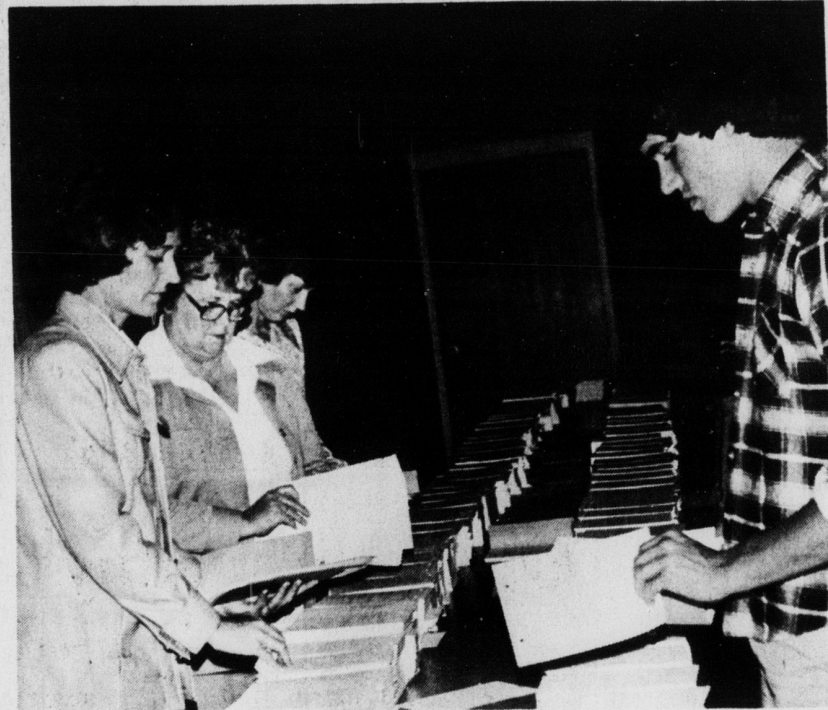
