## Another New Play Staged

Frances Goforth, the Kings Mountain author who wrote "Evening Star" in collaboration with Dr. Howard Richardson of New York City, writes that her play, the first ever written specifically to be performed by senior citizens, was the first show staged at the newly renovated Lamar House-Bijou Theatre complex in Knox-

ville, Tenn. Oct. 28 and 29th before an appreciative audience.

The old theatre, rich in history, was an appropriate site for the performances. The opening night audience responded by giving the predominantly Senior Citizen cast a standing ovation.

Miss Goforth said the cast reached a peak of excellence in their performances.

Joining her in Knoxville, Tenn. on opening night were her brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Goforth of Kings Mountain, their daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Jon Burns of Gastonia, and their daughter, Miss Janice Goforth and Tony Myers of Gastonia.

All proceeds went to the restoration of the Bijou theatre and to the Senior Citizens Theatre in Kingsport.

Both Miss Goforth and Dr. Richardson were presented keys to the city of Knoxville by the Mayor and were honored by the Lamar House-Bijou Theatre Committee at a reception.

Mrs. Joan Hensley, director and cultural arts coordinator for the recreation department in Kingsport, Tenn., directed the show.

Miss Goforth said that through local and national support and contributions in Knoxville, renovations to the theatre were completed prior to her show's opening. The theatre will serve as a center for the performing arts in Knoxville and East Tennessee.

The Lamar House, the earliest part of the building constructed, was partially built around 1816 by Thomas Humes, a wealthy Knoxville merchant. Originally built for use as a tavern, it was used as a hotel as early as 1817.

From 1823, to 1837, the elegant hotel frequently hosted Andrew Jackson. The second floor balcony was a favorite spot for political speeches and was used by President Rutherford B. Hayes when he was honored there in 1877. Besides Jackson and Hayes, three other presidents, Polk, Johnson and Grant, have been guests at the hotel.

In 1909, the Bijou Theatre was built directly behind the Lamar House and was built to serve Knoxville with high class vaudeville at bargain prices. Many great actors, including Ethyl and John Barrymore, Alfred Lunt, Lynn Fontaine and the Peruchi Stock Company have in their day performed at the Bijou.
