

Solar Energy Committee Named

Commissioner Corbet Nicholson has been appointed chairman of a committee to devise application for participation in a solar energy program for the city.

Named to the committee are Commissioners James Childers, Norman King and William Grissom, representing the city government. Private citizens named to the committee include William Hager, Daniel Dilling, Mrs. Charles

Alexander and Buford DeFore.

The committee is expected to begin meeting in early January to begin writing applications for participation in the federal and state funded solar energy program. To complete application will probably take 60 to 90 days.

Mayor John Moss said the application will be to take part in all four categories of funding, public buildings, commercial,

industrial and private homes.

There is a possibility that the public building to receive, if application is approved, the demonstration grant will be the new governmental services facilities building (city hall).

The N. C. Department of Natural and Economic Resources will serve as the city's planner on the program.

The city will also develop a citizens committee to push for the expansion of private housing on a broad range in the community by working with developers and realty offices here.

Also expected this year are 22 additional housing units for the elderly by a private firm in Winston-Salem. Applications are being made for from 12 to 24 new public housing units in Kings Mountain by a local developer.

One of the largest plans for 1978 is a citywide beautification program that will call for personal commitment from every citizen to rekindle a rebirth in pride of ownership and pride of citizenship.

The mayor said many citizens will be called upon to serve on committees for this project to work toward the overall goal of applying for designation as an All-American City.

"I realize that this is an ambitious list and that a substantial commitment will have to be made by both the private citizen and elected officials to make these programs reality," Mayor Moss said.

"As we begin this new year," he continued, "myself and the board of commissioners wish to express our sincere appreciation for your support and cooperation during 1977."
