

For Recreation Program Schools Agree To Lend City Use Of Facilities

To enhance the recreation program for the city the board of commissioners agreed this week to enter into a program with the Kings Mountain District Schools for use of systems grounds and facilities.

Commissioner Bill Grissom and Mayor John Moss have met with Supt. William Davis to discuss the arrangements and the mayor reported Monday night that the school system is in full accord with the idea.

A small fee schedule of \$5 was agreed upon for the city's use of school gymnasium for city recreational programs with the city providing personnel to cleanup after the activities. There will be no fuel or utility charge made to the city.

The gyms will not be available to the city when in use for school functions.

Commissioner James Dickey would like to appeal to the citizens to use only the lights on the city tennis courts they use in the future.

Monday night Dickey asked if individual switches could not be installed on the courts and was told by Harry Wilson, city electrical supt., that individual switches have been installed.

"Tonight I saw one person betting a tennis ball around on a court, but he had every one of the lights turned on," Dickey said. "That burns a lot of kilowatt hours needlessly."

Commissioner Dickey has been appointed to chair a new committee, with Commissioners Bill Grissom and Jim Childers as members, to develop the city's participation of a Disaster Cadre of Personnel.

HUD requested the committee creation.

Dickey and Childers said the city part of the program they dislike is the possibility that local personnel involved will be called away to other states to work in the event of a natural disaster.

Dickey said, "Quite simply what we will do is contact citizens in all fields of service to make themselves available

to serve voluntarily in the event of some disaster. The recent snowstorms and flooding that have devastated some areas are examples. Volunteers offer their services to help the people in the stricken areas."

Mayor Moss said Kings Mountain received such outside help several years ago when pumping machines sank several times in Moss Lake while the lake was being filled.

The local cadre would participate in disaster appeals over an eight-state area.

The commissioners approved accepting petitions from six residents of Sterling Dr. Monday night requesting paving from Brice St. to Applegate Dr. and for 372.48 feet along Applegate Dr. from Sterling Dr.

J. C. Clary of Kings

Mountain was awarded a contract for a bid of 24 cents per pound for approximately 600 pounds of scrap insulated copper wiring the city has in surplus stock.

Feb. 13 was set as "Scout Day in Government" in Kings Mountain at the request of the National Boy Scouts. Young Scouts from the area will be invited to spend the day with various departments of local governments and to attend the board meeting that night for a first hand look at the way local government functions.

The board authorized Mayor Moss to apply to the US Department of Energy for a feasibility study on installing and operating a hydroelectric generating facility at Moss Lake.

Approval was given to

advertise for bids for one van for the Kings Mountain Aging Programs under Title Three. Funds are available for the vehicle.

The mayor was authorized to make final application to the N. C. Governor's Highway Safety Program for a grant for a traffic flow survey and analysis.

The state's share is \$8,600 and the city's, \$1,400.

The mayor was also given approval to apply to the Farmers Home Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture, for a grant to construct a sewer collector line.

The mayor said the line would be used in connection with construction of the wastewater treatment facility at Moss Lake, should the city's plans be approved.
