

Attend Public Meeting Thursday

Want To Invest In Business?

This Thursday night Mayor John H. Moss is calling a public meeting at city hall to discuss the feasibility of organizing a Kings Mountain Development Corporation.

This organization would be formed in connection with the city's recent

confirmed eligibility for Urban Development Action Grants.

According to the mayor the purpose of the 8 p. m. meeting is to determine "the wishes of the citizens in this matter. To find out what value they place on organizing a development corporation to pursue the commercial development of the city."

The meeting is not limited to business, industrial and professional people, the mayor emphasized, it is an opportunity for every interested citizen from all walks of life to participate.

Eligible activities under the UDAG program include commercial, industrial and residential

projects. The grant guidelines also spell out that areas for development outside the applicants jurisdiction, under certain circumstances, are eligible. The program also offers grant assistance to existing business structures as well as for the development of new business structures in the community.

"Eligible activities may receive 25

percent funding," the mayor said. "That means for every three dollars the local corporation raises the Federal funding program will put in one dollar."

"There are several benefits to having such a local development corporation," the mayor continued.
