## Public Hearing Held

The second of three public hearings explaining the Small Cities funding program was held Tuesday at 1 p. m. at the Kings Mountain

Depot Center.
Major John H. Moss and David ong, of the N. C. Department of Natural and Economic Resources, spoke to a large group of senior citizens attending the meeting, explaining the city's plan for ap plying for a three-year comprehensive grant for neighborhood improvements.

A pre-application is due at HUD headquarters in Greensboro by May 15. The final application is due Aug.

30 and funding, if approved, is expected by mid-October.

Long explained, "In the past Kings Mountain has been assured certain grants, but the Small Cities program is a competitive one. Kings Mountain's application must generate enough guideline points in order to be approved for funding."

The comprehensive grant, if approved, would mean about \$3million more federal dollars over a

three year period.

The city officials have a target area selected which will come closer to assuring the city an approved application. The area concerns the

Phenix Mill area and surrounding area. Mayor Moss said, however, other areas may be included in the program. He said a plan to work on "a street here and a water system there" will not generate the necessary points to assure the cit; the Small Cities grant.

The Small Cities program is for improvements to streets such a paving, curb and gutter an sidewalks; improvements to elec trical, water and sewer and natur gas systems; and housing rehabilitation. As are all HUD funding programs, the Small Cities grants are geared to low and moderate income neighborhoods. Imn
