Chamberlain said MICA does not work on getting grants for clients. At present MICA is working with Gaston County, Belmont, Bolling Springs and Shelby in this area. The MICA client list in the state to date numbers 38 counties and communities.

In other action Monday night, the

commissioners approve revising a city ordinance covering bonds required for excavation work.

Al Moretz, city codes director said presently the city requires contractors to put up a \$1,000 bond and with the increased cost of materials and construction, that amount should be increased to \$5,000.

Moretz said the city is charged with maintaining such street work done under contract and by increasing the bond amount the city has a chance of recouping losses when the work is not acceptable. Moretz said it would also encourage contractors to do better quality work.

Tabled action on awarding a contract for a line truck for the electrical department after

receiving two bids. The bids were from USI-Capital Technology Inc. (\$50,365) and Baker Equipment and Engineering Co. (\$50,161), both of Charlotte.

Approved a rezoning request from William H. West to rezone property at 1004 Cleveland Ave., adjacent to the city limits, from R-10 to R-20. The zoning and planning board had recommended the request be approved in its April meeting.

Approved Governor's Highway Street Sign Safety Program, whereby the city upgrades the street name signs. The city's share is 80 percent and the state's 70 percent of costs.

Adopted the city's privilege license schedule, as it stands, for the coming year.
