# No Action On Property Offer

The Kings Mountain Redevelopment Commission has shelved action on an offer from a local businessman to sell 15,283 square feet of property.

The property includes the site of the McCoy station at the corner of W. King and S. Railroad Ave. and the property currently used for vehicle storage by the city.

Gene White, executive director of the redevelopment commission, told the board Tuesday that the property is 106 feet fronting on W. King St. and 150 feet fronting on City St.

"The property is owned by Ed McCoy Jr.," White said. "He has made a verbal offer to sell the property for \$18,000. However, the appraised price for the lot at the end of 1978 was only \$13,700."

White said the property has been considered by the board to be dropped from the urban renewal program. He said he feels the asking price is too far out of line, but the board took no action on either accepting the offer or dropping the parcel from renewal projects.

In other action, the commission approved rent write-offs for several locations. White said under the HUD guidelines, writeoffs are encouraged if investigation shows that collection of the rents would be detrimental to the part concerned.

White informed the board that the contractor, Will Sheen of Shelby, is making corrections of 20 minor items in connection with the pedestrian walk off W. Mountain St. He said final payment will be held up pending final inspection and approval.

The board was also informed that HUD in Atlanta had approved the local employment of Huskins and Jenkins to handle the K.M. Redevelopment Commission Audit which will begin after June 30.

Commissioner Attorney Robert Bradley told the board that all deeds on four different pieces of property in the Canaler Street Project, in which J. O. Plonk has interest, have been acquired. He said, however, that the Elmer Herndon interest in the same property has not been settled.

"I plan to wait until I have all parties signed before processing the package," Bradley said.

The sites in question are vacant lots located on Parker, Watterson, Tracy and Ridge Sts.
