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
Heavy Fines

Trial Set

Harold Lawson Carswell is scheduled to go on trial for murder in Cleveland County Superior Court Mon., July 10.

Carswell is charged with murder in the shooting death of William Leslie Beane in Kings Mountain on Dec. 8, 1977. Beane, of Rt. 2, Granite Falls, was manager of a restaurant here at the time of his death.

Carswell, of Rt. 3, Granite Falls, was arrested at his home near Granite Falls and returned Cleveland County to to stand trial.

Appearing as witnesses against Carswell are Kings Mountain Police Sgt. Richard Reynolds and Ptl. Ralph Grindstaff, SBI Agent Jim Woodard and Phillip Woods and Shirley Green.

Board Adopts Electric Service Regulations

"In . . . mutual protection of both the city and the customer and for the purpose of rendering an impartial and more satisfactory service" the city board adopted allencompassing electrical service regulations Monday.

The regulations were drawn by Southeastern Consultant Engineering and were presented during an hour-long discussion by Bill Little, Jr. at Monday's board meeting.

The regulations cover agreement terms between the city and its customers concerning installation of services, both above and underground and spells out both cost factors to the city and customers

Little explained that the regulations cover the "do's and don'ts" concerned with supplying electrical power to city customers and where responsibilities lie in all cases. The proceedure for billing and payments, rights-of-way, ser-vice interruptions and types of services are also covered in the lengthy document.

Customer costs for services in connection with electrical service, according to Little, are based on costs existing in neighboring communities.

In other action Monday, the board approved granting the Kings Mountain Development Corporation, Inc. an exemption status from having to list securities. The Cleveland County Board of Commissioners granted the exempt status to the corporation on June 5.

Attorney Mickey Corry presented the resolution to the board Monday. He serves as attorney of record for the corporation.

Mayor John Moss commented that the city has been invited by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to submit application for funding for the corporation either in August or November of this year.

Approved authorization for application for planning funds available under the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976. The application will be in cooperation with the Management Improvement Corporation of America. The grant will be for \$4,875, if approved. The funds will cover nine areas of activity study. - Approved amending the city

ordinance governing property cleanup by adding a time limitation of 10-days following the owner, leasee or occupant's receipt of notification from the city. And further that the city can enter the

property, do the work and charge the owner should he refuse to or ignore making the cleanup requested.

- Approved awarding bids on materials for providing service to the new Home Savings and Loan property on W. King St. The con-tracts go to Westinghouse Electric Supply for transformers, \$8,571 and meters and accessories, \$468; Bryant Electric Repair for conductors, \$1,241, conduits and ac. cessories, \$437, cable termination and accessories, \$355, for a total of \$6,072.

- Approved installing 690 lineal feet of water lines for the Kings Mountain Housing Authority on a 50-50 cost basis.

- Approved installing sewer lines for the KM Housing Authority with the authority paying the entire costs. Approved appointment of Larry Hamrick, Jerry Nation and Martha Yarbro to the Planning and Zoning Board.

- Approved a resolution authorizing payment by Citibank of New York to Manufacturers Hanover Bank and New York City \$237.50 to replace coupons lost or misplaced by Manufacturers Hanover Bank.

- Approved advertisement for bids for a copy machine for the public works department.



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
