Educator Team Evaluates Kings Mountain Junior High

A 15-member team of educators representing the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges evaluated Kings Mountain Junior High School during a two-day visitation this week.

Principal Fred Withers and Assistant Principal Gary Shields said that full reports are expected in about two weeks to a month.

Elementary schools in the KM District had similar visits and inspections several weeks ago and KM Senior High, which was accredited about 10 years ago, also underwent re-accreditation procedures.

Local schools have conducted extensive self-studies of the school program during the past 18 months

in steps to gain accreditation by the prestigious group.

Visitors were entertained upon arrival at KMJH Monday with a banquet attended by school staff, school board members and other guests and conducted classroom observation all day Tuesday to examine the programs in action and its overall operation as well as validate the philosophy and objectives set out in the self-studies submitted by the school. Team members were asked to comment on the school's strong points as well as make suggested improvements and general observations concerning the overall school program.

Dr. Nathaniel Shope of Ap-

palachian State University was consultant for the local staff and faculty and Russell Clark of Hunter Huss High, Gastonia, was chairman of the team which also included Dr. Jesse Taylor, school staff and administration; Steve Cherry, philosophy and design; Bob Mason, school plant and facilities; Chloe Lockery, student activities and services; Barbara Davis, language arts; Frances Alston, mathematics; Susan Godfrey, science; Ronald Carroll, social studies; G.C. Harrell, health and physical education; Jane Shields, exceptional children; Margaret McGinnis, cultural arts; Earl Price, occupational education; and Doris Summey, media services.

The Female Fire Brigade

Kings Mountain's first female Fire Brigade has been organized by women employes of Kinmont Industries.

Classes have been underway at the plant for several months and the big "test" was on a recent afternoon when the ladyfolk took the water hoses and extinguished a house fire in a practice alert near the plant.

According to Personnel Manager Barbara McDonald the "Fire Brigade" was organized because "we decided that women could be involved in fire-fighting and in giving us fire protection at the plant while waiting for the firemen to arrive". Meetings of the "Fire Brigade" are held weekly and Bill Ware, of the KM Fire Department,

and representatives of Cleveland Tech have instructed the classes. Women have learned how to operate fire extinguishers, sprinklers and hoses during the training sessions.

Kinmont, which employs 200 people with approximately 85 percent female employes, manufactures bedding, pillows and comforters.

Ward's father, Dee Ward Jr., lives at 5812 Kansas Ave. N.W., Washington, D.C.

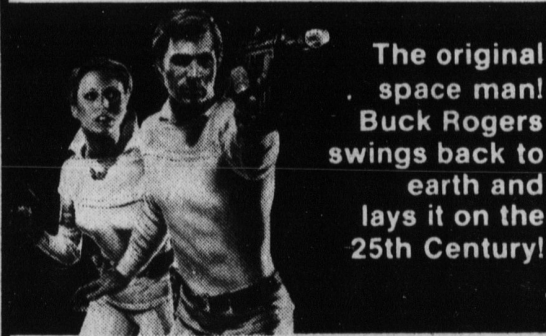
