Postwar frugality dominated the first Ball, where the only decorations were crepe paper garlands. This year, Debutantes will be presented from the stage of the Malcolm E. Brown School-Civic Auditorium, decorated as a beautiful Southern garden.

In the early Ball years, girls wore pastel gowns and carried a nosegay tied with pastel ribbons. Eventually, the custom was established that each girl wears a long white gown, long white gloves and carries a bouquet of red roses.

Each of the young debutantes traditionally choose their fathers as chief marshal and an escort for the numerous social functions preceding the ball.
