Those going on the trip will be leaving Charlotte's Douglas Airport Tuesday, June 26, and will return there Wednesday, July 4. The cost of the trip varies from \$550 to \$620 per person, double occupancy depending on where the individual wishes to stay.

Bill Baucom, executive secretary of alumni, says that the price includes round-trip air fare by charter flight to Honolulu and return to Charlotte, inflight meal, round-trip transfer of the individual luggage and one American breakfast. Optional tours are available for an additional charge, Baucom also noted.

"This is an opportunity for people to see all eight of the Hawaiian Islands if they'd like. We'll spend seven nights in Honolulu, so there will be plenty of opportunity for those on the tour to really explore the many facets of Hawaii, points of interest and shops," Baucom said. Honolulu, located on the

island of Oahu, still remains the focal point of exotic nightlife and fine shopping explains Baucom. "The hotels where we'll be staying are in Honolulu and on or near the fabulous Waikiki Beach," he points out.

Some of the points of interest that Baucom himself will be visiting are the Iolani Palace and Pearl Harbor on Oahu. He also plans to see the exotic flowers of the 'Big Island' of Hawaii which they call 'Orchid Isle.' "I understand that their golfing and tennis facilities are exceptionally fine and they have plenty of them. I'm really looking forward to this trip," Baucom said.

Baucom became executive secretary of the alumni office last fall and this will be his first tour with alumni and friends of the college. Memorial Weekend Will See SHP 'Care'

During Memorial Day weekend, the North Carolina Highway Patrol will join a nationwide effort to reduce accidents on interstate highways. Called "Operation CARE," Combined Accident Reduction Effort, the program will include strict enforcement of the national 55 mph speed limit and high visibility of troopers.

According to State Patrol Commander John T. Jenkins, troopers will heavily patrol interstate highways during the holiday weekend, which begins at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, May 25, and ends at midnight on Monday, May 28.

"In addition to being highly visible," Jenkins

said, "troopers will take enforcement action against motorists who fail to voluntarily comply with the speed limit and other motor vehicle laws."

Twenty-three persons died on North Carolina's highways during Memorial Day weekend in 1978, according to Jenkins. "We are hopeful that, with the cooperation of citizens and our efforts as part of 'Operation CARE,' this will be a safe holiday weekend on the highways."

The program is being sponsored nationally by the U.S. Departments of Transportation and Energy and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Degrees Are Awarded KM, Cleveland County Students

Eight students from Cleveland County were over 2,000 persons to receive degrees from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro during the institution's 87th annual commencement on May 18th, in the Greensboro Coliseum.

Altogether, degrees were awarded to more than 1,400 undergraduates and to 617 graduate students. The latter group included 79 students who

earned doctoral degrees. Completing the requirements for the undergraduate degrees were two Kings Mountain students, Christopher Laughter, a business major, son of Mrs. W.E. Laughter of 600 W. Gold St., a bachelor of science degree; and Judith L. Plonk, an early childhood education major, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence S. Plonk of Cherryville Road, a bachelor of science degree.
