

Wrecks, Break-Ins Reported

The Kings Mountain Police Department reported several wrecks and break-ins during the week.

On May 25, a wreck occurred at the corner of West Mountain and Juniper Streets. Drivers were Jane Katherine Yarbro of 703 W. Mountain Street and Willie James Burris of Chavis Drive in Bessemer City. Yarbro was backing her 1978 Chevrolet from a driveway and hit Burris' vehicle, a 1977 Chevrolet owned by Southern Bell. The accident occurred at 8:26 a.m. Damage to Yarbro's vehicle was estimated at \$2,000. Damage to Burris' vehicle was estimated at \$350.

entered KMHS as sophomores, urged the graduates to make "somebody" out of themselves.

"We not only tried to teach you from the books, but tried to teach you to have pride in your school, community and nation, and to love one another," McRae told the graduates during a brief speech.

Officers of the Senior Class were in charge of the program.

Class President Lee Neisler pointed out that the Class of 1982 not only excelled academically and in athletics, but cared for other people.

"We were part of five bloodmobiles which netted over 800 pints of blood," he said, "and part of a cancer fund drive which raised \$1,877, with our class contributing over \$800."


