Independence Hall To Be Shown Friday

Evening programs will continue at Kings Mountain National Military Park on Friday.

On Friday at 8 p.m. the Kings Mountain National Military Park will set the pace for the Fourth of July weekend with the film Independence Hall. By tracing the events that lead to the drafting of the Declaration of Independence, this film gives relevance and brings life to the buildings that today make up Independence National Historical Park. All who are interested should meet at the National Park Visitor Center.

Due to local Fourth of July celebrations, there will be no evening program on Saturday.

A special concert in the park will be held on Friday, July 9, at 7:30 p.m. The concert will feature the 440th Army Band, North Carolina Army National Guard from Raleigh. In the peaceful setting of the park amphitheater, the band will present an array of musical numbers including patriotic, country, dixieland, and easy listening. Weather permitting, the Living History program will also continue on Saturday and Sunday afternoons. A Revolutionary War campsite will be set up near the Visitor Center and tended by park employees in Revolutionary period dress. Eighteenth century musket and rifle demonstrations will be held at 1, 2, 3, and 4 p.m.

Also the 179-year-old Howser House will be open for visitation on Sunday afternoons from 1 until 4 p.m. A member of the park interpretive staff will be stationed at the house to reveal the history behind this locally famous rock structure.

Other ongoing daily programs include an 18 minute film-Kings Mountain, Turning Point in the South; an 8 minute audio-visual museum exhibit program; 1.5 mile Battlefield Trail; 16 mile system of Hiking Trails and 10 mile system of horse trails.

The public is encouraged and invited to attend all programs. There is no admission fees for any of the programs.
