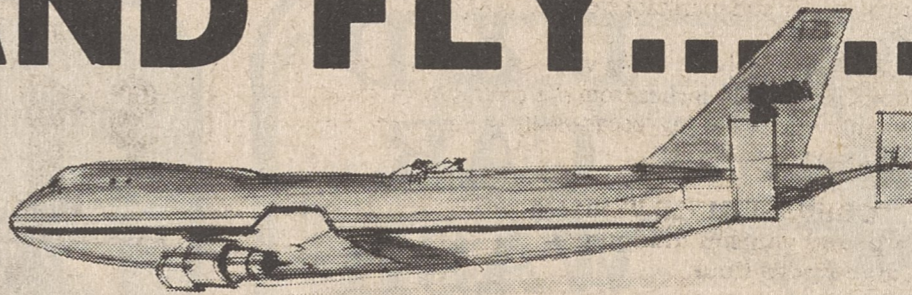

Excedrin and booze dangerous
