Burning Permits Required

An addition of three more burning permit agents have been appointed in Cleveland County. These are Jack Hamrick, Jr. at Jack's Sporting Goods near the junction of Highway 198 and 180; Jim Boggs, Soil Conservation Service in the Cleveland County office building across from Cleveland Technical College and Tommy Turner, Turner's Super-market in Casar.

Burning permits are required for the burning of trash, leaves and brush and land clearing if this burning occurs within 500 feet of the woods. After 4:00 p.m. until midnight, a permit is to required.

Fifty five gallon trash barrels used in burning debris could be made much safer by covering the open top with a heavy screen wire. This keeps live embers

from blowing into dead, dry fuels such as fallen leaves, weeds and grass.

The whole idea of the burning permit law is to prevent woods and grass fires. The majority of people in Cleveland County are careful with fire and take the extra effort to obtain a burning permit. This is what is necessary to prevent wildfires from occurring.

Wrap cooled quick breads in foil or plastic and leave at room temperature overnight. They will slice easier the next day.

Encourage children to help pick up toys by providing a large box, bag, cart or basket with the child's name on it.

And as it was in the days of Noah, so shall it be also in the days of the Son of man. They did eat, they drank, they married wives, they were given in marriage, until the day that Noah entered in the ark, and the flood came, and destroyed them all.

Likewise also as it was in the days of Lot; they did eat, they drank, they bought, they sold, they planted, they builded; But the same day Lot went out of Sodom it rained fire and brimstone from heaven, and destroyed them all.

Even thus shall it be in the day when the Son of man is revealed (Luke 17:26-30).

In the days of Noah and Lot, men were going about their everyday cares of life. Every man was eating, drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, buying and selling, planting and reaping, building and tearing down that which was of no service. These things within themselves seem harmless. Yet, they were destructive. All of the people in Noah's generation were destroyed by a great flood; except Noah and his family. Likewise, All of the people in Lot's generation were destroyed by fire; except, Lot and his family.

What happened? What did these generations do to deserve such destruction? Both questions can be answered at the same time.

First, both generations forgot God. They were enjoying life and caught up in the cares of life. They were having a good time. They saw no harm in their ways and left God out of their lives entirely. God was grossly displeased with them. Had he not been so displeased, He would not have destroyed them so utterly.

Secondly, both generations rejected God. Both were warned. For over a hundred years, Noah built the Ark of safety and warned the people to repent. Likewise, Lot warned the people of Sodom. Abraham had interceded for Sodom, but not even ten righteous men could be found in that wicked city. They were forewarned, they rejected the warning, so they were destroyed.

Friends, do not get so wrapped up in this life that you leave God out AND do not reject the warning I am about to give you. Jesus is coming again. Like Noah and Lot, those who have accepted Him will be saved when He comes. On the other hand, those caught up in life and rejecting Him will be lost. I urge you to check up on your life style and seriously consider my warning.
