A hydro plant would provide enough electricity to operate the city's water and sewer plants, thereby eliminating approximately \$250,000 of energy now acquired by Duke Power to run those plants.

Other programs which should come about in 1983 include:

*Urban Renewal - The city will make a special effort to dispose of surplus urban renewal property so as to encourage additional development of the downtown area.

*Energy - The city will encourage volunteer committees to become active. The recentlyappointed energy committee will

*Health Care - Moss said the completion of the Kings Mountain Hospital expansion program will give the city "an excellent health care facility." The city will also continue to work with
