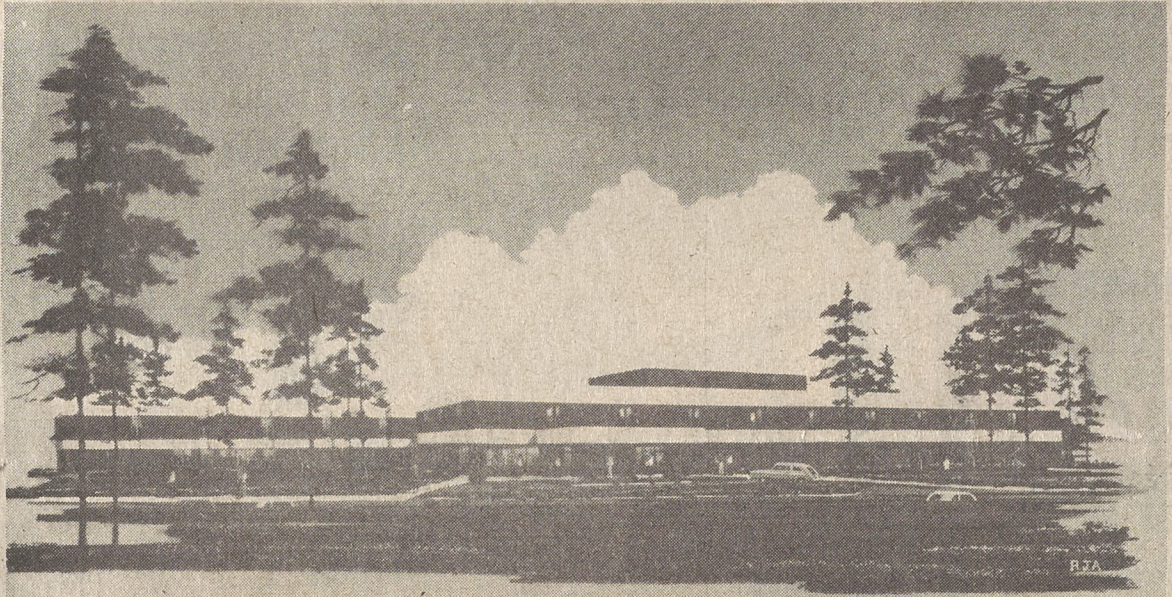
Miss McGill is a graduate of Kings Mountain High School.

they'll be there if we need them," said Grady Howard, hospital Administration.

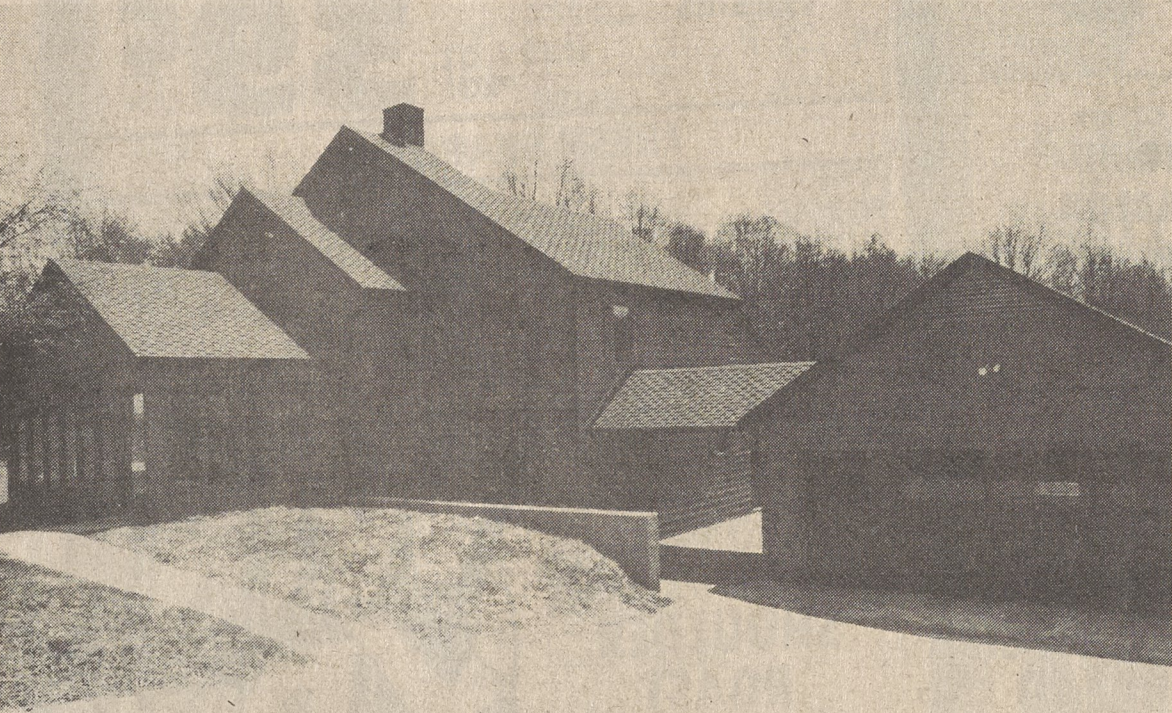

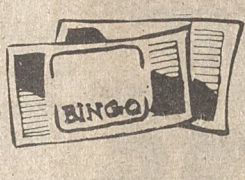

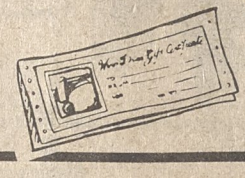
