Mike Huffstickler Scores Two In '63 Opening Game

Mike Huffstickler carried the ball 19 times for 125 yards Friday night as the Mountaineers shut out the Cherryville Ironmen 18-0 before an estimated 4,100 fans in Cherryville's never-before-played-in Rudisill stadium.

It was Kings Mountain all the way as the Mountaineers took the opening kickoff and raced 63 yards to score in nine plays. The drive was aided by a 15 yard penalty.

Larry Helms kicked off to the Mountaineer 20 to Steve Baker who returned 17 yards to the Mountaineer 37. On first down, Huffstickler cracked over his right tackle for five yards, Put-1 nam lost one through the middle, and Huffstickler picked up Kings Mouintain's first first down with a six yard off tackle

plunge. From the 48, Pete Putnam was stopped for no gain. An illegal use of the hands penalty set the Mountaineers back to their 33. It was second down, 25. Quarterback Randall picked up Cherryville's second first down with a right end sweep which netted 14 yards to the Kings Mountain 36. Bill Eaker cracked off tackle for 3, Davis hit off right tackle for 4, and Upton and Eaker added two each to the 25. It looked as though the Ironmen were headed for paydirt but a backfield in motion penalty cost Cherryville a down as Randall tried left end for no gain and Kings Mountain declined the penalty. On second down Randall passed incomplete to Blackwelder at the 10. A clipping penalty was declined by the Mountaineers and it was third and 10, still from the 25.
