The Annual Southwestern District Handicraft Workshop will be held June 12 and 13 at Livingston College in Salisbury, N.C. The workshop is sponsored by the North Carolina Agricultural Extension Service to provide training by skilled craftsmen to persons interested in learning a specific craft and who will in turn teach the craft to others.

Classes to be offered are: tatting, wood carving, stained glass, trapunto vest, design it yourself, shadow-trapunto quilting, basket weaving, open work/hardanger embroidery, calligraphy, rug hooking, rag rug weaving, chair bottoming with diagonal flat reed, battenberg lace (Brussels Lace), chair caning, and decorative pillow construction.

The registration fee for the workshop is \$6.00. Material fees vary with the class. Arrangements may also be made for room and/or board. 
