Shrine Softball Classic Set Here This Weekend

The second annual White Plains Shrine Club Softball Tournament and Barbecue Sale will be held Friday through Sunday.

The softball tournament, featuring some of the top teams in the Carolinas, will begin Friday at 6:30 and continue through Sunday at City Stadium and Deal Street Park.

A late addition to the 16-team field is Howard's-Western Steer of Denver, N.C., formerly Howard's Furniture. The team has been organized for 27 years and has won seven world championships in different levels of competition.

The team features pitcher Don Arndt, "Mr. Softball" of the slowpitch world. He is 49 years old and has been playing softball for most of his life. He is slowpitch softball's all-time home run king.

Other key players on the Howard's team are Rick Sherrill, Tim Rhinehart and Russell Bradley.

"There will be no better softball played in North Carolina this year than what you'll see in the Shriners Classic in Kings Mountain this weekend," prorunner-up to Gastonia Heating both at Kings Mountain and for the North Carolina State Open title last year. The Greensboro team would like nothing better than to whip the Gastonia club and get some revenge in Kings Mountain this weekend.

Loftis Roofing is the defending South Carolina Open Champion and also won the U.S.S.S.A. national championship last year.

Blanton's Barbecue is a newcomer to the Kings Mountain field but will field a powerful ballclub. Blanton's recently defeated Howard's-Western Steer for the champinship of the Wilmington Azalea Slowpitch Classic. One of the team's top performers is Mickey Morrison, who once played for Champion's Landscaping of Kings Mountain.

Others in the field will be LeeRoy's Frame of Hickory, the N.C. Class B defending champs; Southern Wholesale of Charlotte, the defending Charlotte City League champs; Skidmore Construction of Gastonia, a long-time Gaston County power; Hudson Sports of Lincolnton, the defending Lincolnton City League champs; Electro-Ade of Spartanburg, Carolina Merchants of Gastonia, the 1983 Gastonia Industrial League champs and fourth place finishers in the Class C. World tournament; Baucom's Nursery of Charlotte, Keller Associates of Charlotte; and some local teams. Action will get underway Friday at 6:30 p.m., Saturday at noon and Sunday at 1 p.m. Sunday's championship round will be dedicated to J.D. McDonald, a former Pharr Yarns player who was the first North Carolina player inducted into the ASA Softball Hall of Fame. A special seating section will be reserved for McDonald and his former teammates and McDonald will throw out the first pitch to start the championship game.

The barbecue sale will get underway Saturday at 10 a.m. beside City Auto and Truck Parts on Highway 161.

Tickets are \$30 for a whole shoulder, \$3.50 for a plate and \$1 for sandwiches. Tickets may be purchased from any Shriner, or at City Auto and Truck Parts, Champion's Construction, Home Federal Savings and Loan and Linwood Restaurant. For delivery of tickets, call Carl Champion's office at 739-9511.

A full line of concessions will also be available at both ballparks. Hamburgers, hot dogs, popcorn and drinks will be available, and White Plains Shrine Softball Classic T-shirts will also be available at reasonable prices.

All proceeds from the softball tournament and barbecue sale will be given to the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children in Greenville, S.C. The Shriners raised over \$8,000 last year.

Morgan won the first Carolina event, held on Lake Murray near Columbia, S.C., and Wise won the second event held recently at Lake Norman.

The fishermen at Clark Hill Lake will be vying for about \$9,375 in prize money, with the winner earning about \$3,125. Cash awards will go to the top 10 percent of the field.
