KM Cemetery Probe Is Nearing Completion

Mid-July is the date citizens can expect completion of a cemetery investigation underway by the Special Bureau of Investigation.

Agent Dan Crawford said that the SBI is conducting a time-consuming review of accounts receivable to the city for the past five years and those accounts, involving the cemetery department, are being checked against the actual number of lots and monuments sold at the city-owned Mountain Rest Cemetery.

Members of the city cemetery committee chaired by Commissioner Irvin Allen,

Jr. asked the city police department and the District Attorney's office to call for the impartial SBI investigation into allegations of missing funds within the cemetery operation after citizen complaint.

Commissioner Allen has said that when completed the SBI report would be forwarded to District Attorney Marty Shuford for review and determination if there has been criminal action.

At the center of the investigation is veteran City Cemetery Superintendent Ken Jenkins.




