Quarter Losses

MARTINSVILLE, VA.-Tultex Corporation, a leading producer of fleeced apparel and activewear, today reported net sales of \$45,972,000 and a net loss of \$201,000, or three cents per share, for the second fiscal quarter ended June 1, 1985. For the same quarter of 1984, the company had sales of \$64,154,000 and net income of \$1,491,000, or 16 cents per share.

For the first six months, sales were \$98,480,000 compared with \$120,499,000 for the same period of 1984, and net income amounted to \$686,000, or seven cents per share, compared with \$2,209,000, or 24 cents per share, for the first half of 1984.

"The adverse comparisons in the second quarter and first half were caused by the discontinuance of several special brand-name and ladies knit fashion lines," W.F. Franck, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer, stated. "These products had a heavy shipment ratio for the spring months in years past, and the effect of eliminating them reduced sales substantially and brought a corresponding decline in absorption of overhead.

"Demand for fleeced apparel remains strong," Franck said. "Our apparel plants are sold ahead through the end of the fiscal year, and our yarn plants are operating on a five and one-half day basis. We believe that our current order position, together with the benefits from changes we have made to reduce operating costs, will result in a significant year-to-year improvement in profits during the last two fiscal quarters of 1985.'


