South Point's Red Raiders, defending Southwestern 3-A Conference champions and tied for second place with the Mountaineers, provide the opposition this week and East Rutherford's Cavaliers, sporting one of their finest teams in years, comes to town next

Kings Mountain, 3-1 in the conference and 6-1 overall, is seeking a spot in the state playoffs for the first time in 21 years. The Mountaineers haven't appeared in a football playoff game since 1964 when they won the SWC with a 10-0 record before falling to Hickory 6-0 in the first round of what was then the Western North Carolina playoffs.




