Kings Mountain High's wrestlers tacked on the Southwestern 3-A Conference tournament championship to

The Mountaineers compiled 158½ points and had six wrestlers win individual championships. KM's undefeated 148-pounder, Vince Sullens, was voted the Vince Sullens, was voted the tournament's most outstanding wrestler. He recorded a 27-second pin over Keith Panell of South Point in the

finals.

Burns, which trailed the Mountaineers by only a half point going into the championship round, finished a distant second with 125 points. Shelby was third with 111½, followed by R-S Central 106½, North Gaston 104, South Point 74 and Chase 65.
