


## Woman's Body **Found Near KM**

Sheriff Buddy McKinney would not rule out the possibility of foul play but said it is not suspected because of the location of the remains and because of Mrs. Newman appeared to have been fully clothed at the time of death. He said he believes she wandered into the woods end lost her way as she walk-ed back toward Kings Mountain.

Because of the body's ad-vanced state of decomposi-tion, Dr. Hudson said a physical examination of the remains would not reveal a cause of death unless there should be evidence of a bullet or knife having pierced the bone.

"It's very sad to have to come to the close of a case in this fashion" said Sheriff McKinney, "but I know the family is relieved to know the certainty of her death. My sympathy goes out to the family."
