"A Farmer With Sparkling Eyes" is how The Charlotte Observer described Mary Barrett, who died Feb. 17 at age 106.

Mrs. Barrett, whose father was half brother of the late Robert Barber of Piedmont Avenue in Kings Mountain, farmed cotton and corn, raised nine children, read the Bible and outlived her genera-

She died in York County's Bethel Community at the home of her daughter, Naomi Baird, where she had lived since 1961. She had been suffering from pneumonia.

Mrs. Barrett was born into a farming family on Sept. 1, 1880. Her father, William Barber, had fought in the Civil War. She married William Monroe Barrett in 1903 and they moved to

Clover. He was an overseer at Clover Spinning Mill until at Clover ARP Church, inter-1923 and then he moved to the ment following in Woodside Hawthorne Mill on South Main Street. He died three years later of leukemia at

age 42. In 1930, Mrs. Barrett took her seven children and moved to a farm off Faulkner Road in Clover where she built a two story eight room house for \$3,500 and also took in her parents as well as a niece and granddaughter. In addition to running the household, Mrs. Barrett worked in the fields and lived on the farm until 1961. She also had 17 grandchildren, 43 great-grandchildren, and five
