boiling the eggs or with additions to the dye mixture that will harden shells.

One long-time participant informed me that in the entire history of the event there has been only one bad moment, and that was when one hard-boiled character actually smuggled a glass egg, dyed to look like the real thing, into a fight. He was winning at every turn until someone took the glass egg and hit it against a very hard object and the bogus egg shattered. The interloper at the time learned that glass can be a pain—and he also learned the hazards of putting all of one's eggs into a single basket.

Otherwise the event, always held on Easter morning, is only a world of fun: the participants take it seriously as men in suits, kids in jeans, and women in Sunday dresses have at each other.

In a couple of hours the crowd broke up, all eggs having been similarly broken or recognized as victors, and by 11 o'clock egg-fighters were as scarce as hen's teeth.

I had one final question: What happens to the defeated eggs? And I was told that some are fed to hogs, some to dogs, some are eaten that morning, some become deviled eggs, and dozens are taken home to be pickled and enjoyed weeks later.

Two or three times the fights were interrupted when an automobile slowly eased its way down the highway, but otherwise the combat continued all over the road, in yards, and in the backs of trucks. And I actually took part in an egg fight and won four eggs that were to go into my trophy case—my wife says it's been empty as long as she's known me and ought to have something symbolic in it—but Jed, my prize-winning egg dog, confiscated the prizes and left me with only a shell of memories of my first egg fight.

## Waugh To Head Bike-A-Thon

The Leukemia Society of America, North Carolina chapter, has announced that the 1988 Spring Bike-A-Thon chairperson for Grover will be the Rev. Phillip Waugh, pastor of Grover's First Baptist Church.

The Leukemia Society of America is a national voluntary health agency dedicated solely to seeking the cause and eventual cure of leukemia and allied diseases.

Proceeds from the bike-athon will support the North Carolina chapter's programs for research and patient aid. Currently, the chapter is funding \$1.7 million in research projects in the state at UNC-Chapel Hill, Duke University and Wake Forest University. The Leukemia Society of America is also providing financial assistance to 810 patients in North Carolina.

The cause of leukemia remains unknown. However, the effectiveness of recently developed treatment methods and steady advances in research bring us

closer every day to finding the cause or causes of leukemia and related disorders and probable cures. Leukemia causes the death of more children than any other disease and more adults than children are stricken each year.
