young but talented R-S team, but the Mountaineers did manage to keep the lead throughout the contest.

The Mountaineers, who had on-ly 155 yards rushing, drove the opening kickoff 55 yards for a TD following a good return. Fullback Toby Deaton and tailback Victor Bell did all of the running and Bell scored from seven yards out. He also had runs of 12 and 16 yards during the march. Todd McDaniel booted the point-after for a 7-0 lead.

R-S came back to score on a seven yard pass from Harris to Bryan Miller but the Hilltoppers' extra point was wide and KM still led 7-6.

Lockhart scored on a one-yard plunge to make it 13-6 early in the second period, but the KM extra point attempt was wide and that gave R-S the chance to take the lead after a one-yard touchdown run by Chad Hamby. But Harris's pass for a two-point conversion went into the ground after he felt the heat of the KM

good job of giving the offense good field position and punter Todd McDaniel kept R-S backed up most of the night.

"Our defense forced a lot of turnovers and picked one up and took it in for a touchdown," Hicks noted. "That's the type of things you have to do against a good football team. We feel good that our kids are doing these

things." Hicks said he was pleased with the offensive performance despite five turnovers-four fumbles and one interception. "Taking the first possession and moving right down the field to score put us in real good shape,' he said. "We had the opportunity from then on out to control the ballgame but we turned it over a couple of times and that got them back into the game."

The victory was the second straight for the Mountaineers and left them at 2-2 in the Southwestern 3-A Conference and 4-3 overall. R-S dropped to 2-2 in the conference and 2-5 overall.

Deaton led the KM offense with 77 yards in 15 carries and Bell adadded five tackles, caused one fumble and recovered a fumble. During halftime ceremonies, Allyson Bumgardner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Bumgard-ner, was crowned KMHS homecoming queen.
