Kings Mountain City Council Amends Budget

Kings Mountain Council Tuesday night amended the 1988-89 fiscal \$175,938.00. year budget from \$15,690,371.00 to \$16, 578, 904.61, a record budget.

For the first time, the Kings Mountain Police Department heads 297.50, up from \$596, 894.00. the appropriations in the general fund with a record \$1, 044, 337.00, up from \$985, 247.00.

City Clerk-Treasurer Marvin Chappell said that bulk of line items \$8,100.00(same) were due to the implementation of a ments in salaries and in change orders and additions since the board adopted the budget on June 30, 1988.


