Planning Board Denies Request For Car Wash

A request by Mrs. Wilma Mauney for rezoning of that the P&Z Board considers the request for rezoning her property at the corner of Gold Street and Phifer automatically withdrawn. Road to accommodate an automatic self-service car wash was denied 4-0 by the Planning and Zoning Board Thursday night.

Seventy adjoining property owners on Phifer Road protested the rezoning of the property and presented a petition signed by 175 property owners opposed to the new construction.

The property owner now has the option to withdraw the application or she can present the request in writing to the Kings Mountain City Council to be presented at a meeting of the Council.
