Three years later, she was hired to set up the cosmetology department at Kings Mountain High School. When Mrs. Whitworth was hired as cosmetologist for the Kings Mountain School System, not many people in Bessemer City knew what the term meant and fewer than that could pronounce the word or spell it!

"Living there meant I drove 50 miles each day to Kings Mountain and back," commented Mrs. Whitworth. Mrs. Whitworth's job for the past twenty-three years has been a 12-month per year employment and did not include a lengthy summer vacation period that public school teachers enjoy. That has resulted in her driving 50 miles to

"I leave home for school at 6:45 a.m. each day and some days I have stayed until 7 o'clock or later, especially on lab days." She pointed out. "In my twenty-three years, I have spent so many hours at Kings Mountain High School that it seems like my home."


