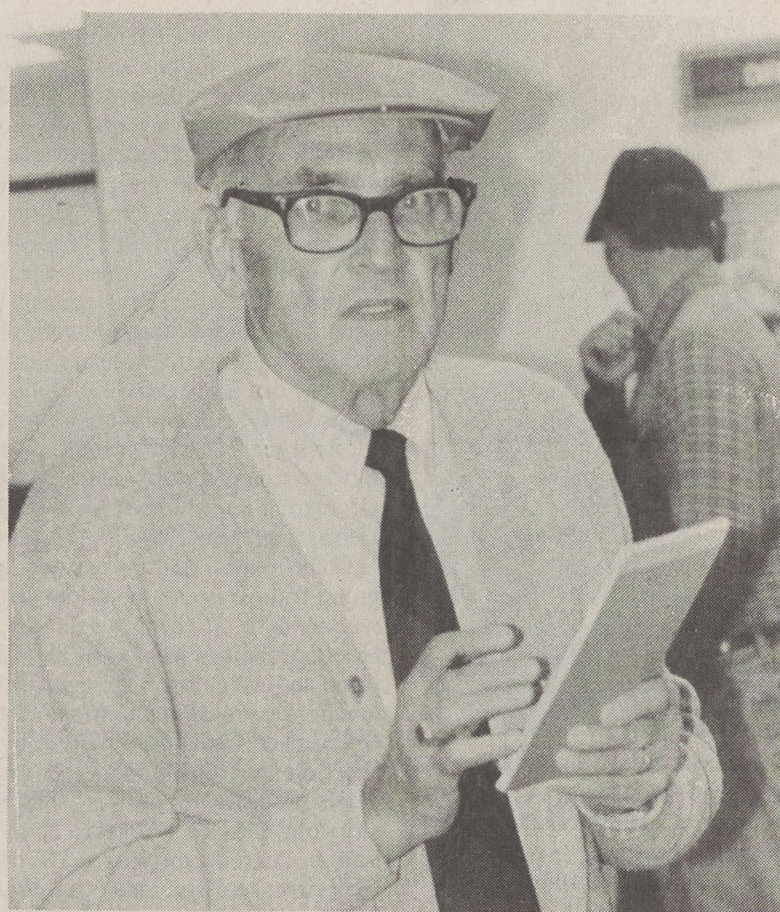
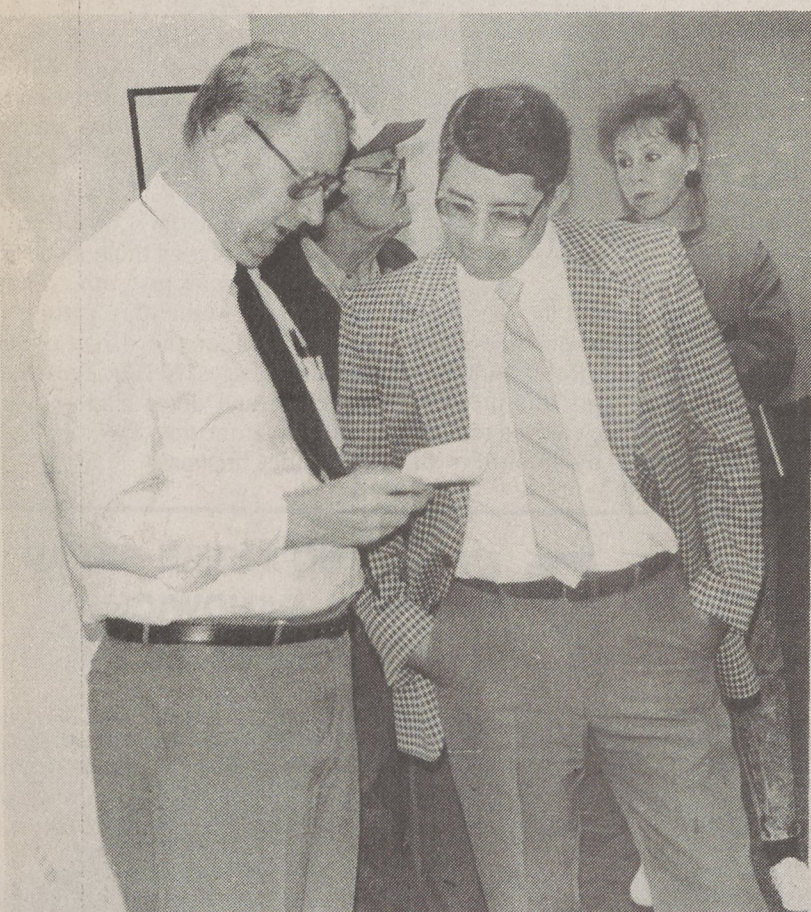


ELECTION NIGHT
