White was mailing letters this week, which included a fact sheet on Project R-2625 to local Senators and school and community leaders. He was also asking community leadership to contact Ken Younger, of Cherryville, member- at- large on the committee, Division Engineer Ray Spangler and District Highway Engineer Clyde Ledbetter urging DOT to place the project on an accelerated funding status this fiscal year due to the critical need in the west end of the city. He also included a copy of the

map which shows the north-south connector highlighted in yellow.

for the project was submitted to the C. Department of Transportation May 22 and the feasibility study is scheduled to be completed by Aug. 31

The priority for funding of the project is set by the D.O.T member and staff of D.O.T in the area with final approval by the full board.

Completion of the new Middle School has compounded the traffic problem," said White, who termed the project fairly inexpensive but critical.

White said the city points out that the need for earlier funding has become a critical matter as a result of the completion by the schools of a major segment of its capital project improvement program. 
