### **Enrollment Highest** ears

According to Cleveland Community College president Dr. L. Steve Thornburg, more students are enrolled in CCC this fall than in any quarter in the past 15 years.

About 1,630 students signed up for classes this quarter, the most since fall quarter of 1975 when approximately 2,000 were enrolled. Enrollment in recent years has averaged about 1,300.

Although the increase is spread across the board, the college transfer program, which is in its third




### **Beauty Pageant Planned At Fair**
