KM Schools To Hold Parent Fair

Kings Mountain District Schools will sponsor a Parent Fair on Tues., Nov. 13 from 6-9 p.m. at Kings Mountain Middle School. Parents from each of the district's eight schools are invited to attend.

"Make Education a Family Matter" will be the keynote address and will be given by Patsy Linker. Ms. Linker is a consultant and trainer with companies in Charlotte in developing parent involvement in education programs. While employed by Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools she was instrumental in the founding of their parent involvement program called "Education is a Family Affair."

Mini workshop sessions will be offered in the following areas of interest:

Session 1 - "Creative Art Ideas." Presenter, Lisa Olsen, art teacher, Kings Mountain High and Judy Hancock, art teacher, Middle School. This will be a hands on session where participants learn some inexpensive, creative art projects to do with young children.
