Dr. Alma Watson, director of the sponsoring Communities in Schools program, said the three specialists bring a variety of skills with experience in working with children and families and helping agencies in the county.

The three schools, one in each system, have become pilot sites in a countywide effort, said Watson, to see that families have the resources and support they need during the child-rearing years. One goal is dropout prevention.

"We respect parents as the primary educators of their children," said Anthony. "The key is primary prevention. It all boils down to family. The root causes of problems grow out of the family and we are going to have to work with

families and children at an early

Anthony has experience in public and school health programs. She was director of the Cleveland County Girl's Club before becoming executive director of the Adolescent Health Council in Gaston County. Her work there in preventing teen pregnancies with the Choices for Success program was similar to what she will do here. She has also worked as a prevention specialist with CODAP-the Cleveland County Community Organization for Drug Abuse Prevention.
