Vandals shooting out street lights

A factory defective disconnect switch in the new Gaston Street 12KV Substation put 1500 people in the dark Saturday from 7:40 a.m.-11:15 a.m., according to Utility Superintendent Jimmy Maney.
Power was off at some businesses and homes in a scattered area of the city.
"This was brand new equipment but it took awhile to find the problem. Duke Power's high power line knocked out too," said Maney.
Maney is asking Kings Mountain utility customers to help

find the culprits who are shooting out street lights with BB and pellet guns and vandalizing the new Gaston Street substation.
Rock-throwing vandals are hitting glass insulators that can cause serious problems in the main power line. "This big dollar equipment is nothing to play with," said Maney. He said the city averages replacing 20-25 street lights a month shot out by vandals armed with pellet guns.
Call the Electric Department or Police, says Maney, if you observe vandalism in the substation or see someone shooting out lights.

councilman Jack Herndon, a member of the planning board.
Mayor Ronald Queen said the board had asked McCarter to make a presentation on how county planning relates to the area because the board had "kicked the idea of zoning for Grover around for years."
Town Attorney Bill Lamb said the board is seriously ready to move on a zoning ordinance but wants to coordinate with the county's plans for zoning.
The board voted 4-1 to grant a variance to Doris Cooke who wants to place a double-wide trailer on the back wooded lot of her

property on Hardin Circle. Mayor Pro Tem Sandra Ellis opposed because she said several other property owners had been denied similar requests. The board is looking at making changes in its present ordinance to allow mobile homes on half-acre lots but stipulating they must have sloped roofs and be underrpinned.
On recommendation of the mayor or the board voted to get bids for tennis courts at Brice Harry Park. Contractor Carl Champion is grading for an infield and soccer field at the park.
The board appointed Commissioner Herndon as cemetery commissioner and instructed the town attorney to verify the deeds to the city owned cemetery.

mented: "I think there's some real promise in this program, but if a significant number of parents don't, we don't need to force this on them."
Another hot issue before the board this month is the Personnel Policies section of the district policy manual, which the board has set a goal of reviewing before the end of this year.
McRae gave his recommendations after the policy was reviewed by an outside consultant and the Personnel Policies Committee. Committee chairperson Betsy Wells had alternative recommendations for some of the policies, including the reduction in force policy.
McRae said that seniority should not be the only criteria by which teachers would be let go in case of a needed reduction in force.
Wells said the committee recommended that seniority be the key element in deciding who to keep and who to let go.
"We are not saying you do not

want to look at performance of employees," Wells said. She said using performance as a criteria could "squelch dissent" and "open a can of worms."
Out of the 72 policies in the Personnel Policies section, McRae said the committee and he came to agreement on about 60 -- a pretty good record, he said.
In other action, the board looked over a proposed budget for next year, which is being readied to be submitted to the Board of County Commissioners.
The quarter of a million dollar budget has a nine percent increase in current expenses and a 6.6 percent increase in capital outlay. The budget is available at the superintendent's office upon request.
The next meeting will be held Thursday, April 9, at 7:30 p.m. in the board room of the administration building.
