In other actions, the board: Authorized the sale of city property, 204 acre off John Cline Road near Moss Lake, to Jeffrey B. Richardson at the appraised value of \$1,955.

Adopted a new ordinance on junked cars and authorized the city manager to execute services contract with towing companies on rotating basis.

Authorized proposals to provide banking services for the City of Kings Mountain and appointed

Commissioners Fred Finger, Phil Hager and Norma Bridges to serve with the mayor and city financial officers Jeff Rosencrans and Maxine Parsons to review them. Manager Wood abstained from serving on the committee since his wife is employed by a Kings Mountain financial institution.

Appointed an ad hoc committee under the Americans with Disabilities Act to advise the city on such matters as employment practices, accessibility to public buildings, etc. The committee will be chaired by Personnel Manager Charles Webber and Recreation Director David Hancock and also include Commissioners Guyton, Hager, and Jerry White and Julie Durham and Buck Bridges.

Adopted resolution upgrading Moss Lake rules and regulations in ordinance form. The ordinance spells out penalties for violations and strict enforcement by the city. Alex Berkley, engineer with W. K. Dickson Company, prepared the study and it was presented in detail at several utility committee meetings.

Set a moratorium of 60 days on additional taxi franchises pending review of the existing ordinance by City Attorney Mickey Corry.

Boy Scout Travis Wilson and Brownie Scout Kelli Wilson were recognized as visitors.

After an executive session, the board voted to set a special meeting for Monday at 5 p.m. to discuss amortization guidelines in the works from a state study committee on such things as billboards, mobile home parks, etc.

The board authorized the city manager to write a letter to the city of Shelby in response to that city's requests for gas line extensions in the area of Woodbridge at Moss Lake. Mayor Scott Neisler said Kings Mountain is looking at the area with an eye to running gas line extensions "in the future."

over 12 inches in height, a point of concentration of quantities of gasoline, oil or other flammable or explosive materials as evidenced by odor; one which has areas of confinement which can't be operated from the inside, such as trunks, hoods, etc. situated or located where there is danger of it falling or turning over; one which is a point of collection of garbage or waste; one which has sharp parts which are jagged or contain sharp edges of metal or glass;

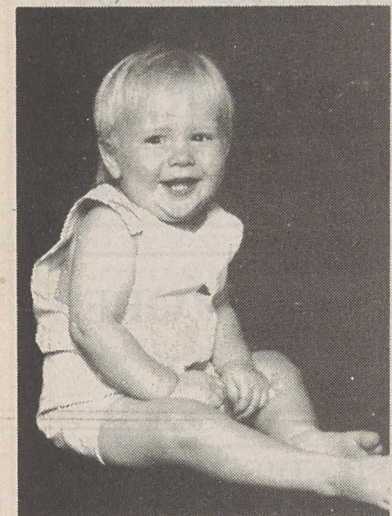
The ordinance gives the police authority to remove vehicles abandoned in the streets that are obstructing traffic, parked in violation of restricted parking, parked in a non-stopping or standing zone, parked in loading zones, or parked in bus zones.

The owner can request a probable cause hearing on

the removal of vehicles. Abandoned, nuisance or junked motor vehicles unclaimed by the owner will be disposed of by the tow truck operator or towing business having custody of the vehicle. Before a probable cause hearing, the owner may obtain possession of the removed vehicle by paying the towing fee, storage charges, posting a bond for double the amount of such fees and charges to the towing business.

The ordinance spells out the process the city takes in notifying the registered owners. A request for a hearing must be filed by the owner in writing with the county magistrate designated by the chief district court judge. The magistrate will set the hearing within 72 hours of receipt of the request from the owner.

City Manager George Wood said the city needs to make the ordinance more stringent to preserve the livability and attractiveness of the neighborhoods, which would promote tourism and industrial growth in the area and present primary public visibility to visitors.
