Spectrum, Parkdale ranked in top 100

ranked as one of the fastest growing companies in North Carolina, according to an annual survey of the state's top 100 privately owned companies, and Parkdale Mills, which operates a local plant here, is ranked No. 3.

In a recession year that saw 24 companies move up 10 spots or more on the survey by the international accounting firm Arthur Andersen, Spectrum moved up 32 spots, from 76th to 44th. Parkdale moved up six spots, from No. 9 to No. 3, ranking in the elite Top 10.

Doran Textiles, of Shelby, the only other Cleveland County company on the survey, moved up six and spun and cotton fabrics for the spots, moving from 22nd in 1991 to 16th this year.

Spectrum is a package dyer of weaving industries. C. Douglas Industries, No. 1 in the Top 10 last

Spectrum Dyed Yarns Inc. is Blanchard is executive officer. Parkdale manufacturers cotton and cotton/synthetic yarns for the apparel and industrial trades. W. Duke Kimbrell of Gastonia is executive officer.

The local companies moved up the ladder because of increased sales growth, according to Mike Henderson, Andersen's tax partner in preparing the list.

Revenue for Spectrum was estimated in the survey at between \$50 million and \$99 million. Revenue for Parkdale was estimated at \$500 million and above. Revenue for Doran was estimated at between \$100 million and \$249 million. Doran makes spun and dyed yarns apparel, industrial and home furnishings industry.

Several of the state's top compatextile yarns for the knitting and nies, including Burlington

year, were acquired last year and became public companies and no longer qualify for the survey, said Henderson.

The North Carolina 100 was compiled this year for the 9th time by the international professional services firm of Arthur Andersen. The 1992 North Carolina 100 is featured in a cover story of the June issue of "Business North Carolina" magazine.

The continued recession took its toll in 1991. Henderson commented, "This is evidenced by the fact that, for the first time in the eightyear history of the survey, the threshold for getting in actually decreased." Henderson said companies choosing to participate in the survey are assured that the financial information provided to Arthur Andersen will be held in strict confidence and that revenues will be categorized by range and employment listed statistically.

Reb Wiesener was the last one to contact the hospital in California. He says "Mike was cut badly over


