

Food Lion helping hurricane victims

The Food Lion grocery chain will deliver a million pounds of canned goods and non-perishable items to the Miami region while another 80,000 pounds will be trucked to Louisiana. Food Lion President Tom Smith will present a \$100,000 donation to the American Red Cross Disaster Relief Fund, on behalf of the supermarket chain's 57,000 employees. American Red Cross officials will accept the do-nation which will be used to expedite emergency relief services for the victims of Hurricane Andrew.

Smith said, "The terrible tragedy of Hurricane Andrew's devastation has mobilized the Food Lion Family in the tradition of community spirit and generosity that has occurred whenever Americans are called upon during times of emergency. In the recent past, Food Lion has contributed significant amounts to Desert Storm and the Red Cross (Hurricane Hugo Relief) to assist Americans in troubling circumstances. Food Lion can do no less, for the victims of Hurricane Andrew and is most grateful for the immediate and overwhelming response of its employees, vendors and customers."

In the immediate aftermath of Hurricane Andrew, Food Lion initiated a full-scale emergency relief campaign at all of its 938 stores. The \$100,000 donation is part of an overall effort that will see convoys of Food Lion semi-tractor trailers leaving from 577 cities in a 13-state region for Florida and Louisiana. The trucks will unload at distribution points designated by the Red Cross.

Wiener Works features true foot-long hot dog

Wiener Works at Kings Mountain Plaza was doing steady business as owner and manager Bill Jarvis sat down to talk about his restaurant.

The fast food restaurant has been in the same location since December 1974. Before being named Wiener Works, it was a Wiener King, Jarvis said.

Jarvis worked at a McDonald's franchise in Asheville before moving to Kings Mountain, where he said he will never leave.

"I like this better than Asheville," he said. "No traffic, people are more friendly and not as hurried."

Although born and raised in Asheville, Jarvis and his wife, Debbie, Greg, 11, Jason, 8, and daughter, Jackie, 6, moved to Kings Mountain in 1988. Debbie works along side Jarvis behind the grill at Wiener Works.

Their biggest seller is the foot-long hot dog, which is actually 12 inches long. Most other foot-longs are only 10 inches, Jarvis said.

The hot dogs are made especially for Wiener Works. "You can't buy them in a grocery store," Jarvis said.

They also serve homemade chili, along with all the usual hot dog toppings

Wiener Works employs six to eight part-time and full-time workers. The restaurant is open 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Saturday. It is closed on Sundays.
