## Senate candidate Teddy visits State Legislature

Teddy, whose district covers Rutherford County and most of Cleveland County, paid a visit to Senator Ollie Harris, the incumbent of the district, who is stepping down at the end of his current term.

During lunch, Senator Harris advised Teddy to "get out and hit the streets and let folks know who you are." As SEnator Harris led Teddy on a tour of the Senate Chamber, they discussed some of the issues that will top the Senate primary in the 37th district.

"I feel it's important for me to acknowledge Senator Harris's 44 years of service to the people of the 37th district," said Teddy. 


