The dreaded daylight savings time.


All the signs of renewal are beginning to speak to us. The earth is coming out of hibernation in full color. Spring is here.

In applying Yogi's observation to the lives of contemporary Americans, we cannot help but recognize that many have followed in his footsteps with respect to their faith expression. For many, participation in a faith community has become a matter of observation only, a kind of away-from-the home entertainment package. So unknowingly, Yogi has described more than the game.

With the newness of spring comes a chance for each of us to deepen our faith commitment through more than thoughts but action.
