Summer time is reading time at Mauney Memorial Library.



The Legislators' School for Youth Leadership Development offers some 300 rising eighth through 12th graders an opportunity to develop skills in leadership, critical thinking and communication. Located on the campus of Western Carolina University, the three-week residential program utilizes the cultural and recreational resources of WCU and the setting adjacent to the Great Smoky Mountains

It is operated in two sessions, June 18-July 8 for 10th through 12 graders, and July 10-30 for eighth and ninth graders, by WCU's Office for Rural Education.

During their stay, students participate in academic and special interest courses in photography, journalism, computers, art, astronomy and other topics. Community service work and discussions about current issues, led by state and regional leaders, are important aspects of the program. It is funded by the General Assembly. A similar school operates at East Carolina
