Hopper admits there were times when she thought she wouldn't make it. She credits her instructors at No. 3, Deborah Ray and Gail Ross with helping her through. Her perseverance has paid off with a job that she enjoys and one that she could only have gotten with a high school diploma.

Hopper now works in the Family Resource Center at No. 3 as a parent patron. Her job is to help parents get involved in their children's education.




